Betty Webb has had an interesting and varied career. Before she became a prize-winning mystery writer, she was a journalist, interviewing everyone from presidents and astronauts who walked on the moon to Nobel Prize winners. She earned her way through art school working as a folk singer. She gave up music for a stint as a commercial artist on

Madison Avenue. At various other times she picked cotton, raised chickens, worked in a zoo, was a go-go dancer, ran a horse farm and founded a literary magazine. In 1982, she moved to Scottsdale, Ariz., the setting of her Lena Jones mystery series. Her latest novel, "Desert Vengeance," the ninth in the series, was released in 2017. She still lives in Scottsdale.

As a child, Australian author Candice Fox would eavesdrop as her father told harrowing stories to other family members about his job as a parole officer. Those stories must have influenced her later in life when she became a writer of crime thrillers. Her first novel, "Hades," won the Ned Kelly Award for best debut in 2014 from the Australian Crime Writers Assn.

Her sequel, "Eden," won the Ned Kelly Award for best crime novel in 2015, making her only the second writer to win the award back to back. Fox began collaborating with author James Patterson in 2015, with the novel "Never Never," which rose to No. 1 on the New York Times bestseller list. Their sequel, "Fifty Fifty," came out last year. Fox lives in Sydney.

The Friends of the Library Gift Shop has always been an integral part of the library. It was started shortly after the Friends was formed and was originally located in the Art Gallery Corner of the original Neutra wing of the Central Library in 1975. With the addition of the new wing in 1993, the shop was relocated and designed by the architect exclusively for the Friends. It was given a prominent location by the front entrance with lots of windows to display merchandise.

Our Gift Shop has been the template for gift shops at other libraries. Committee members of Friends from other libraries in California would study our operation to set up their own gift shop.

We have been fortunate to have buyers over the years of its operation who have continuously sought out tasteful and unique items not usually found in most stores. Also the display is always eye-catching. The shop is a great place to buy hard-to-find gifts. All profit from the shop goes to the FOTL board, which in turn donates proceeds to the library to buy books and unbudgeted items. So every time you make a purchase you are helping the library. The Gift Shop is staffed totally by

dedicated volunteers, who man the shop all the hours the library is open. The volunteers do three-hour shifts per week. There are a total of 36 volunteers in the shop. Some of them have been volunteering for 25 years. They still love it.

The Gift Shop offers a host of gift items, jewelry, journals, children's toys and books, greeting cards and even has a rental library of best sellers. Members of Friends of the Library always get a 10% discount on their purchases.

Having lived all her life in Oakland, Nancy Elliott was unsure about moving to Southern California. However, because her five children all decided to attend college in Southern California, it was an inevitability, especially since some of her children are having children of their own.

Nancy volunteers at the Main Street Branch, reshelving and arranging books. She likes giving back to the library because she grew up two blocks away from one and was a frequent visitor. Nancy moved to Huntington Beach two years ago and has been volunteering at the library ever since.

Nancy trained and worked as a registered nurse. Surgery, obstetrics, dermatology, as well as other medical specialties, were all areas in which she worked. Nancy especially enjoyed being a school nurse, both at the elementary and high school levels. Having recently retired from nursing, she volunteers both at the Main Street Branch and at Hoag Hospital, the latter due to a neighbor across the street who works there. She volunteers in the maternity and pediatric units.

After volunteering at Hoag a bit, Nancy realized there was something else she could contribute to the patients -- to restart her duties as a Eucharistic Minister, a lay person who



is trained to give communion to those who cannot attend church. In addition, she serves on the Hoag Auxiliary Board, which governs the hospital's 2,000 volunteers.

In her spare time, she babysits her two grandsons, ages 5 and 3, who live in Huntington Beach. She especially loves picking out and taking them books from the library. Besides these grandkids, she also has several other grandchildren in Los Angeles and San Diego.

Nancy and her husband, although unsure at first, are very happy that they made the move from Northern to Southern California.







“The Paris Wife” by Paula McLain

Set in Paris in the 1920s, the book tells a fictionalized account of Ernest Hemingway and his first wife, Hadley. It tells of them as members of the group in Paris, The Lost Generation, which included Gertrude Stein and F. Scott Fitzgerald. This is about the early life of Hemingway as he struggles to write his first novel, on his way to fame.

Betty’s Take: I enjoyed reading about life in Paris and finding out about how Hemingway began his career.

“Until Tuesday: A Wounded Warrior and the Golden Retriever Who Saved Him” by Luis Carlos Montalvan

This is a true life account of a former army captain, who was decorated with the Combat Action Badge, two Bronze Stars and a Purple Heart, and his return to civilian life after 17 years in the service. He returns with injuries and a severe case of post-traumatic stress disorder (PTSD). The book recounts his readjustment to nonmilitary life and how the addition of the golden retriever, Tuesday, adds to his recovery.

Betty’s Take: It was eye-opening to see how a veteran’s post-military life can be difficult to manage. I particularly enjoyed seeing the bond grow between the author and his dog.

“Wonder” by R.J. Palacio

August Pullman was born with a facial difference, that, up to now, has prevented him from going to a mainstream school. Starting at Beecher Prep, he only wants to be treated like an ordinary kid -- but his new classmates can’t get past his extraordinary face. The story begins from Auggie’s point of view, but then changes to that of his classmates, his sister,

her boyfriend, and others. These perspectives converge in a portrait of one community’s struggle with empathy, compassion and acceptance. The book was recently made into a movie, starring Julia Roberts and Owen Wilson.


Jacqueline’s Take: It was such a thoughtful story of a young boy’s struggle with physical handicaps. I liked how the story was told from various perspectives. The book just pulls at your heartstrings and makes you want to be a better person.

“World in My Eyes: The Autobiography” by Richard Blade

This is an uncensored insider’s look into the world of music, movies and TV and its biggest stars, starting in the 60s to the 2000s. The story begins with Blade’s student days at Oxford, then as a disco DJ in European clubs, finally coming to the United States and breaking through the Los Angeles radio scene and becoming the No. 1 morning drive personality in California. From his TV and radio shows to his feature films and live gigs, he shares his stories.

Jacqueline’s Take: It took me back to my younger days when I started listening to music and how all these amazing bands came to be. Of course, it also tells of how hard Richard Blade worked to become a DJ here in the U.S. LOVE LOVE this book!
